

Mary Hoffschwelle is associate provost for strategic planning and partnerships and a professor of History. A longtime member of the Department of History, Hoffschwelle served as director of MT Engage from 2016–19 and joined the Provost's Office staff in 2019. Hoffschwelle's current responsibilities include leading and supporting the University's planning processes; serving as the SACSCOC institutional accreditation liaison; oversight of the University's programmatic accreditations and external program reviews; and Academic Affairs support of the University's Carnegie Elective Classification for Community Engagement.

Born in Billings, Montana, Hoffschwelle grew up in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and graduated from Chatham College. She earned her master's degree from the College of William and Mary and spent the first part of her career working in the museum field at Colonial Williamsburg, the Montana Historical Society, and Oaklands Historic House Museum in Murfreesboro.

Hoffschwelle's Ph.D. in History from Vanderbilt University led to her first book, *Rebuilding the Rural Southern Community: Reformers, Schools, and Homes in Tennessee, 1900–1930*. Her second book, *The Rosenwald Schools of the American South*, has allowed her to collaborate with Rosenwald School community members such as the Shiloh School in Notasulga, Alabama; the Fairview School in Cave Spring, Georgia; and the Polk-Clark School in Milan, Tennessee.
