WHO ARE OUR STUDENTS?

- Undergraduates usually comprise about 87% of total enrollment.
- Graduate students comprise about 13% of total enrollment.

WHO ARE OUR STUDENTS?

- Our freshman class is a remarkably traditional group of students.
 - Average ACT usually about a 23. (state average - 19.1)
 - Average class GPA usually about 3.5.
- Over half of our students have transferred from another institution.
- UG admission: 22 ACT or 3.0 GPA or 19ACT + 2.7 GPA



WHO ARE OUR STUDENTS?

- We have a very racially diverse student body: more than one-third are students of color.
 - Typically, approximately 15% African American, 8% Hispanic, 9% Asian, Pacific Islander, Alaskan Native, Native American, and multiracial.

WHO ARE OUR STUDENTS?

- Approximately 88% of our students are classified as in-state, about 12% out-of-state and international.
- Most of our students come from Rutherford and contiguous counties.

WHO ARE OUR STUDENTS?

- About 1/3 are Pell eligible
- Average Family income \$100,000
- Tuition just under \$9,878/year
- Most work a part-time job

WHO LIVES ON CAMPUS?



- There will be 2666 residential students
- 52% returning students (1377)
- 48% new students (1289)
- 45% male (1210)
- 56% female (1456)
- 40% (1078) are freshmen

60% (1588) upperclassmen or graduate students

37 states; 19 countries

9% disability/health concern

10% (270) will reside in private or single rooms

24% (637) will reside in on-campus apartments

66% (1759) will reside in shared residence halls

WHEN TO CONTACT SACC?

Sometimes students will approach you directly for help. You also may observe one or more of the following:

- Changes in mood or behavior (i.e. withdrawal, unexplained crying or outbursts)
- Anxiety or depression
- Traumatic changes in personal relationships (i.e. loss, death)
- References to suicide
- Drug and alcohol abuse
- Sleeping or eating problems
- Learning/academic problems or declines in performance or class attendance
- Worry about failure, dropping out, or transferring

HOW TO CONTACT SACC?



- If you have concerns about a student or would like some suggestions about how to approach a student, please call Dr. Mary Kaye Anderson (or designee) at 615.898.2670.
- In the event of an emergency situation involving a student, it is important to respond by calling the University Police at 615.898.2424.

WHAT TO SHARE WITH SACC?

- The more information the SACC has to work with the better they will be able to provide appropriate referrals.
- The SACC needs background information/history on the student of concern from the reporting party.
- The key to successful collaborations are in the details and specifics provided by the reporting party (i.e. copies of communications and details about interventions that have been tried).
- Avoid making assumptions about a student's behavior or the questions from the SACC. Most of the questions are basic information gathering inquiries.
- Our goal is to fill in the blanks and complete the picture in order to best serve the student.

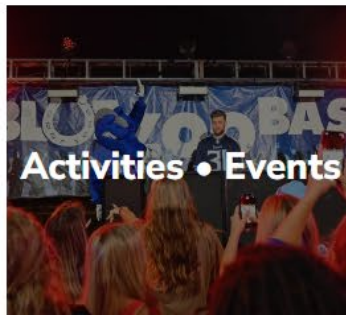

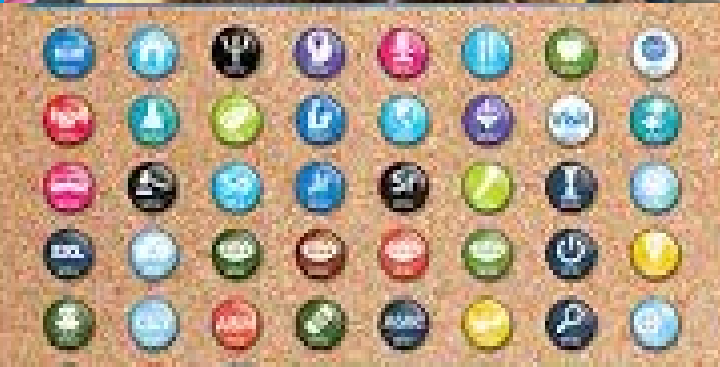
