The Murfreesboro Community Concert Band was organized in 1984 for area musicians who had played in high school and college bands but were without a performance outlet for their years of instrumental experience. Joseph T. Smith was the founding director and conductor from 1984 to 2000. The band, now known as the Tennessee Valley Winds, comprises area band directors and local professionals such as doctors, salespersons, accountants, university students, and teachers. Meeting weekly, these men and women continue their enjoyment of band music with a degree of proficiency which will astound the listener.

The band enjoys a most enviable reputation from musicians as well as from "the person on the street." While the men and women in the band are serious about their music, the group's concerts are designed for a variety of tastes and the enjoyment of all. A typical concert program elicits a variety of responses: toe tapping to a hoedown, melancholia to a Stephen Foster folk song, sultry sensuousness to a Wagnerian love song, or rousing excitement to the William Tell Overture.



Thomas C. Duffy



Thomas C. Duffy is deputy dean of the School of Music and the director of bands at Yale University. He received his Bachelor of Science in Music Education (magna cum laude) and Master of Musical Arts in Composition from the University of Connecticut, and his Doctor of Musical Arts in Composition from Cornell University, where he studied with Karel Husa and Steven Stucky. He has taught music courses at the Hartford Conservatory, the University of Connecticut, the Auburn Maximum Security Correctional Facility, Cornell University, and Yale University.

Recordings and performances of Mr. Duffy's music include those by college bands, orchestras, and wind ensembles throughout the world. Mr. Duffy has conducted bands and orchestras throughout the United States and Japan, England, France, Ireland, and Italy.

He has served as president of the New England College Band Association, president of the CBDNA (College Band Directors National Association) Eastern Division, president of Connecticut Composers Inc., publicity co-chairman for the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, chairman of the Connecticut Music Educators Association Professional Affairs and Government Relations Committees, and he is a member of American Composers Alliance, BMI, and the American Bandmasters Association. Mr. Duffy represents music education in Yale's Teacher Preparation Program. His music is published by American Composers Alliance, Ludwig Music, and Bourne Company Music Publishers. In 1996, Dr. Duffy was selected as Outstanding Music Educator of the Year by the Connecticut Music Educators Association. (June 1997)

Duffy's first influence, Charles Whittenberg, was hailed at one point as the primary American scion of the second Viennese School. While studying with Whittenberg, he worked in depth with serialism and the ordering of all parameters of music. Duffy attended Cornell University, attracted by Karel Husa's unique combination of the art of musical composition with themes of contemporary importance. Duffy first came into contact with Husa's quarter-tones and proportional notation as a saxophonist in the Wind Ensemble at the University of Connecticut. While at Cornell, he also studied with Steven Stucky, from whom he contracted an interest in the music of Dallapiccola, Ligeti, Reich, Glass, Xenakis, and Lutoslawski.

Robert W. Rumbelow




Robert W. Rumbelow is in his sixth year as conductor and director of Wind Ensemble Activitities as well as Conductor of Opera in the Schwob School of Music at Columbia State University. He also teaches classes in conducting, orchestration, composition, and wind literatuare. In addition, Dr. Rumbelow is the conductor of the Greater Columbus Youth Orchestra and the professional chamber ensemble Camerata Musica. Dr. Rumbelow previously served as the associate conductor of the famed Eastman Wind Ensemble and Eastman Wind Orchestra. He also worked with the Eastman Studio Orchestra, Kilbourn Orchestra, Musica Nova, and the independent Rochester Chamber Players.

Dr. Rumbelow received his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in conducting from Eastman and studied with Donald Hunsberger. Prior to his doctoral studies at Eastman, he successfully served as a director of bands in the Texas public schools.

Dr. Rumbelow maintains a very active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician, arranger, composer, and lecturer. The recipient of several notable accolades, including the Walter Hagen Conducting Prize, Dr. Rumbelow is in constant demand throughout the United States, Canada, and Japan as a conductor for both wind bands and orchestras. Outstanding performances of the CSU Wind Ensemble under the direction of Dr. Rumbelow have been recorded and broadcast on NPR and Georgia Public Broadcasting.


Recent performances and live recordings by the ensemble at statewide and national conferences have brought widespread praise for the wind ensemble program. His arrangements and compositions are published by Kjos, Ludwig, and Warner Brothers Music Publishers (Donald Hunsberger Wind Library). Broadcasts of Dr. Rumbelow's music have been heard on PBS, NPR, BBC, and NHK Japan. Most recently, Dr. Rumbelow was awarded a 2001 ASCAP Award for his writing and, in January 2002, the National Band Association's Citation of Excellence for his contributions to the wind band profession.



Richard Anthony Murphy

Richard Murphy is assistant professor and director of bands at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro, where he guides all facets of the University Band, including conducting the University's Wind Ensemble, the School of Music's premier wind and percussion ensemble. Additionally, he teaches undergraduate conducting, wind band literature, and supervises instrumental student teaching. He is also co-conductor of the Tennessee Valley Winds, an adult community concert band.

Prior to his appointment at MTSU, he was band director at three Nashville high schools-Hillwood, Antioch, and McGavock. The Nashville bands under his direction consistently distinguished themselves by receiving superior ratings in both concert and marching events, performing at state music conventions, and receiving many first-place trophies. Murphy is a research associate and contributor to the GIA publication, Teaching Music Through Performance in Band, Volume IV and Volume V. He has been on the faculty at Vanderbilt University's Blair School of Music, was conductor of the Nashville Youth Repertory Orchestra, has been awarded two Citations of Excellence for his contributions to the profession by the National Band Association, and has been inducted into the Middle Tennessee State University Band of Blue Hall of Fame. He holds membership and elected office in many professional organizations, is an elected member of Phi Beta Mu, where he currently is president of the Tennessee chapter, and serves as conductor, clinician, and adjudicator throughout the United States.




J. Ashley Jarrell

J. Ashley Jarrell, a native of McMinnville, conducts the symphonic band and the athletic bands at MTSU. Prior to his appointment at MTSU, he was associate director of bands at Harpeth High School and Harpeth Middle School in Kingston Springs.

Jarrell received his Master of Arts degree from MTSU in 2000 where he was a graduate conducting assistant with the band program for two years. He received his Bachelor of Music degree in 1998 from East Tennessee State University in Johnson City. While at ETSU, he was drum major of the "Marching Bucs" for three years. He is the co-founder and clinician of The Contemporary Field Technique Clinic for Drum Major, Guard, and Percussion, currently in its third year.

Jarrell continues to actively study conducting and has studied with many noteworthy conductors including Frederick Fennell, Mallory Thompson, and Robert Rumbelow. He is also active as a clinician and adjudicator throughout the southeast.

Jarrell is a member of MTSBOA, TMEA, Pi Kappa Lambda, and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia.



Terry Jolley

Terry Jolley is currently the director/ manager of BAND USA, an All-American honor marching band for graduating seniors. He also holds the position of co-conductor of the Tennessee Valley Winds, a community concert band. Prior to assuming his duties with BAND USA, Jolley was associate director of bands at Middle Tennessee State University and assistant professor of Music Education. While at MTSU, he conducted the Symphonic Band, directed the MTSU "Band of Blue," taught music education classes, and directed the MTSU Athletic Pep Bands.

Before joining MTSU, he served as codirector of bands at John Overton High School in Nashville and as director of bands at Warren County Senior High School in McMinnville. His bands consistently received superior ratings in both concert and marching events and performed at state, regional, and national events and received recognition at the national level with awards such as the Sudler Shield presented by the John Philip Sousa Foundation.

Jolley serves as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator throughout the southeast, is an active arranger, drill writer, and consultant for numerous bands throughout the nation, and has been a staff drill writer for Arranger's Publishing Company. He has served as chair for area and local events including TMEA All-State Chair, All-State Band Chair, TMEA Equipment Chair, MTSBOA Concert Festival Host, and MTSBOA Clinic Band Host. He held the position of Director of The Governor's School for the Arts.

Jolley has been awarded three citations of excellence by the National Band Association, was selected to Who's Who Among American Teachers in 1994 and 1996, was the recipient of the National Collegiate Music Award in 1998, and was inducted into MTSU "Band of Blue" Club Hall of Fame in the fall of 2000.



John M. Long



Dr. John M. Long is dean of the School of Fine Arts, Director of Bands, and Distinguished Professor of Music Emeritus at Troy State University. He is past president of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association and is active as a guest conductor, speaker, clinician, and adjudicator throughout the United States, Europe, Canada, and Mexico.

Dr. Long's bands have played many times for national conventions including the American Bandmaster's Association, the College Band Directors National Association, the Music Education National Convention, and the Alabama Music Education Convention. Dr. Long is a statewide civic leader, having served 24 years on the Alabama Historical Commission and having served as president of the Troy School Board, president of the Troy Rotary Club, and president of the Pike County Chamber of Commerce.

In 1977, Dr. Long was elected to the Alabama Bandmasters Hall of Fame and was the first active bandmaster to be elected. He received the National Kappa Kappa Psi Distinguished Service to Music in 1979. In 1984, he was selected as the Outstanding Music Educator of the Year by the Alabama Music Educators Association, the first person to be so honored, and was also selected for Who's Who in America. In February 1996, he was inducted into the National Band Association's Hall of Fame of Distinguished Band Conductors, which is the highest honor that can be bestowed on an American bandmaster. In December 1998 he was awarded the Sudler Gold Medal of Honor from the Sousa Foundation and the Blue-Gray Association dedicated the nationally televised football game to him for his 42 years of service as halftime director. Troy State University has two buildings named for him and, in 1998, the Board of Trustees at TSU named the School of Music the "John M. Long School of Music." In December 2001 he received the AWAPA award from the National Band Association for a "lifetime contribution to the band movement."
