The goal of the CNVC for 2017-2018 was to continue promoting bystander awareness and assault prevention. The main activity for the year was the creation and awarding of the Tina Stewart Campus Nonviolence Fund, a funding opportunity for student and staff projects that prevent student violence, educate students on consent and safe dating, publicize campus resources for victims and bystanders, or other related goals. A total of \$5000 was awarded for three projects for the Spring 2018 semester. The funded projects are as follow:

- 1. The Holocaust Studies Program was allotted \$100 to promote the 2018 Biennial Holocaust and Genocide Studies Conference. The conference hosted Ms. Niemat Ahmadi, a Darfur survivor and president of Women for Darfur Action. The conference took place April 19-21.
- 2. The Center for Educational Media was allotted \$2900 to produce a series of four public service announcements to promote non-violence on campus. These

- public service announcements will focus on gender-based violence and other forms of power-based violence on campus.
- 3. Health Promotion was allotted \$2000 to bring the "What Were You Wearing?" art installation to MTSU. This exhibit aims to address the myth that a person's clothing choices could somehow invite sexual assault. The funds were used to purchase advertising materials and supplies for the event, including dress forms, partitions and upholstery pins. This event occurred April 2-6.

The committee plans to continue this funding into the next year, with awards for projects in Fall 2018 and Spring 2019.

3. Hands Across MTSU

- a) This event will occur on Monday, November 6 at 12:30 p.m. (during class change time)
- b) Partly in response to white supremacist fliers posted on campus.
- c) To encourage acceptance of diversity and equality at MTSU, students, faculty, and staff will hold hands across campus from the REC Center to the JUB.
- d) We need at least 800 participants but are aiming for 1000.
- e) Tell your peers, coworkers, students, and student groups about this event. Dan Kelley and Jackie Victory will send emails to this committee if they find a specific need for their assistance.
- f) Athletic plans to announce event at football and basketball games.
- 4. Refuse to be a Victim (RTBV): 250 packets can be used for training.
 - a) University Police still have the packets. They are looking for an opportunity to hold a workshop on campus.
 - b) This workshop gives students the tools and knowledge on how to stay safe on campus, at home, etc.

- c) Jeff Martinez with University Police has obtained new videos about active shooter situations. He plans to bring to next meeting for us to watch.
- 5) Elect a chair and secretary
 - a) Amy York elected as the committee chair and Abbigail Tracy will take minutes.
- 6) Discuss future meetings: At last meeting, consensus was afternoon meetings work best.
 - a) Once Abbigail, Diane, and Katie have the application and criteria created for non-violence program funding, we will determine next meeting to review.

The subcommittee received three applications. Upon recommendation by the subcommittee and approval by the CNVC, the following funds were granted:

Campus Non-violence Committee Meeting April 20, 2018

In attendance: Amy York, Diane Turnham, Maigan Wipfli, Buddy Peaster, Jeff Martinez, Katie Foss, Carl Ostrowski, Danny Kelley, Barbara Scales, Mary Kaye Anderson

The group discussed possible CNVC activities for Fall 2018. Ideas include:

- Having a table at #MTBaeWatch on August 28 to hand out CNVC buttons and promote Tina Stewart funding.
- We also discussed other Connection Point activities that might be a good fit for CNVC involvement, such as the August 26 Shut Up and Dance event at Tucker Theater, which is expected to have a #MeToo component.
- A mention of the recent student stalker case on campus prompted a discussion about what faculty do and don't know about referring students to campus services.
 - Someone suggested that the CNVC create a Fact Sheet/Contact Sheet of who students can talk to when they have problems or concerns, including a list of confidential contacts.
 - We also discussed how students and faculty often don't understand the administrative process when they make complaints; e.g., what steps are taken when a Title IX complaint is made and why it might seem to take a long time. There are many issues that faculty need more training on, and this committee might help facilitate or promote that.
 - o Someone suggested that a member of the committee might respond to "viral" safety issues on the MTSU Parent and Family Facebook page, but it was decided that such responses are best left to more official channels (campus police, Deb Sells, etc.)
- A committee member noted that there are no current workshops on what constitutes a healthy relationship (romantic or friendship). Because of the prevalence of online communication, normal face-to-face interactions may come off as awkward or be misconstrued ("Is he stalking or just trying to be my friend?").

As this is the last committee meeting of the academic year, the chair will submit a year-end report by May 11.
