

With this issue of the GCN Guide we welcome Tom Zickgraf as our new editor. In upcoming issues, you will see changes that reflect Tom's input.


Our immediate change is a column about featured segments on the local show "Between The Lines."





DEAR DAVID:

My partner and I have been together now for a year and a half and have had a disagreement about whether or not a child is a possibility in our future. I am 26 and my lover is a bit older than I.

I'm not sure I'm willing to promise not to have a child, as right now, that's a pretty big thing to rule out. But my lover has already raised one child and doesn't want to raise another - in fact, she's adamant.

This has not threatened our relationship, but it is one of the few things we have disagreed on. I realize that there is a possibility that our relationship won't last forever, but I certainly expect it to, and I suspect my lover does, too.

I know this is something that I could just ignore and hope won't come up again, but realistically, it probably will come up again. There's no middle ground here; sooner or later someone will have to win out or change their mind. Do you have any ideas on how this might be resolved?

Dear B.T.

This is a situation which will take time to process in terms of making a decision. Communicate openly and honestly with your lover. The best way is to keep your ultimate criteria always in your mind -- the relationship is permanent. Based on this, talk it out. Express your concerns and feelings. Listen to your lover's concerns and feelings. And you're right someone will have to compromise. But, if your love is strong and the desire to maintain the relationship is the ultimate goal, then the relationship should turn out stronger because it was a relational decision and not a unilateral decision. Many relationships reach a breaking point when one partner makes a decision that impacts too heavily on the other and without the other's input. If you approach it like this, you'll be in the best position to make things better. You can also supplement your talks by having third parties, who know you both well, give you feedback. This will provide objective input which should give you added insights to decide.

Old friendships and ties are revitalized, if only to convey the message "I'm thinking about you and wish you well." Family and friends become extra special around now as we ease up on work responsibilities to enjoy the homey simplicity we have denied ourselves all busy year long.

For many gays and lesbians the holidays are tinged with an element of sadness that most of society is spared. The traditions and cozy scenes we have all come to associate with this season, as with other times of year, are so heavily dictated by heterosexual sensibilities (please, no jokes about oxymorons).

As children excitedly open presents on Christmas morn to the delight of their parents, gay "Aunt" Sue or "Uncle" Jim fondly watch from their ambivalent perches, at once feeling involved in the moment and yet alienated from its immediacy. If ever we lament the absence of children in our lives, it is surely during these times.

Then there's the company Christmas gala: posh hotel ballroom, plenty to gorge upon and imbibe, dancing until two, everyone meeting and greeting

each other's spouses, fiance's and sweeties. Well, er, almost everyone. What a bold statement of self to show up with one's lover! Picture this scene:

"Mr. Bentley, this is my lover, Bob Miller. Bob, this is my boss, John Bentley."



"Oh, uh, hello Bob, uh, g-good to meet you."


