Aleshia Brevard 1937-2017

LGBT+ History

Aleshia Brevard was born in Erwin, Tennessee on December 9, 1937 and was assigned male at birth. Growing up as a boy in a religious household in rural


Tennessee, "Buddy" was always close to her mother and saw herself as a woman even from the earliest years of her life. After moving to San Francisco immediately following her high school graduation, Aleshia worked as a female impersonator at Finocchio's Club in SF under the name "Lee Shaw" in the early 1960s. Beginning her transition when she was 21 years old, she underwent gender affirmation surgery (known as sexual reassignment surgery at the time). Aleshia became one of the first women in US history to undergo such a procedure, before the term transgender had even been coined. After medically transitioning, Aleshia found her way back to Tennessee and enrolled as an undergraduate student at MTSU in 1965 to pursue her B.S. degree in Speech, although she was known then as A'Leshia Brevard Lee or A'Leshia Crenshaw. An active member of the student organization the Buchanan Players, Aleshia was a vibrant part of the campus community and it was during her time at MTSU that she grew into her identity. Aleshia went on to attend graduate school at Marshall University in West Virgina, and later returned to MTSU a second time to pursue her M.A. in Theater.

"For me, as well as for my early sisters, the goal was never to live with a 'T' before our names. Our objective was to blend so thoroughly that the things mixed could not be recognized. It was a choice, made not because we felt any shame about our transsexual history, but because our goal had always been to live fully as the women we'd been born to be."
