# 2026-2027 Graduate Catalog [Working]

## Legal Studies, Business Law Concentration, M.S.

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The Department of Accounting offers an M.S. in Legal Studies with concentrations in Anti-Money Laundering, Fraud and Compliance; Business Law; and Entertainment. This is a versatile, non-thesis program designed for business professionals and individuals seeking a deeper understanding of U.S. laws and the legal system but who will not practice law and do not require a Juris Doctor degree. Housed in MTSU's AACSB-accredited Jennings A. Jones College of Business, and offered in collaboration with the Scott Borchetta College of Media and Entertainment and the Nashville School of Law (NSL), the program equips students with a broad understanding of the U.S. legal system.

The Business Law concentration is designed for individuals who want to sharpen their understanding of the legal environment in which businesses operate-whether in corporate, government, nonprofit, or entrepreneurial settings. Coursework emphasizes building practical knowledge and skills in contracts, employment law, negotiation, and other selected business law topics to develop sound business strategies within legal and ethical frameworks to communicate effectively with legal counsel and stakeholders.

Prospective applicants are encouraged to contact the program director to schedule a phone, virtual, or in-person meeting. The program director also serves as the academic advisor and welcomes prospective applicants to learn more about the program's structure and how it may align with applicants' academic and professional goals.

## **Admission Requirements**

Admission to the M.S. in Legal Studies Business Law Concentration requires one of the following:

- a graduate or professional degree from an accredited institution of higher education or if the applicant was enrolled in another graduate program but did not earn a degree from that program, they must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.00 on all graduate work from an accredited institution of higher education and a minimum of 2.75 on all undergraduate work from an accredited institution of higher education.
- 2. a bachelor's degree earned from an accredited institution of higher education with GPA of 3.00 or higher;
- 3. an earned bachelor's degree with a GPA of 2.75 from an accredited institution of higher education or higher and five (5) or more years of professional/managerial or military experience.

**NOTE:** These are minimum requirements. All steps in the Application Procedures below and the supportive materials described in those steps are required and must be received by the College of Graduate Studies before the applicant will be considered for admission.

## **Application Procedures**

All application materials are to be submitted to the College of Graduate Studies.

Students admitted to the Business Law concentration begin this program with summer core courses. Applicants are encouraged to apply early as space for the Nashville School of Law courses may be limited. Completed applications must be submitted by March 1 to receive priority admission consideration for the upcoming summer start. Applications will be accepted after March 1, but admission consideration is not guaranteed. Applicants must submit the following:

- an application with the appropriate application fee (online at <a href="www.mtsu.edu/graduate/apply.php">www.mtsu.edu/graduate/apply.php</a>). Once this initial application has been accepted, the applicant will receive directions on how to enter the graduate portal to be able to submit other materials.
- official transcripts from all previously attended colleges or universities;
- 3. a resume or curriculum vitae that includes
  - · Full name, address, and phone number;
  - Post-secondary institutions attended, including GPA, major, minor and degrees earned;
  - Employment history, including employer names, job titles, dates of employment, and brief description of responsibilities.
- 4. a professional statement and in two to three double-spaced pages describe:
  - · Why you are interested in this specific program
  - · Your professional and academic goals
  - Why you feel you will be successful in this program.
- 5. a signed Consent/FERPA Release Form (available in the application portal) authorizing the exchange of academic information with the Nashville School of Law.

# **Degree Requirements**

The Master of Science in Legal Studies with a concentration in Business Law requires completion of 30 semester hours.

#### Candidate must

- 1. complete a minimum of 30 semester hours of graduate coursework, which includes the required courses, with a minimum GPA of 3.0.
- 2. complete all courses within six (6) years from the time of admission.
- 3. have no more than six (6) credit hours of C grade coursework applied toward the master's degree.
- 4. have no grade below a C- applied toward the degree; however, all grades are included in the calculation of the cumulative GPA.
- reapply for admission if one or more semesters is missed, excluding summers, regardless of the reason. If admission requirements have changed since their initial admission, students applying for readmission will have to meet the new requirements.
- 6. take no more than 30 percent of the total degree hours dual listed as undergraduate/graduate hours (5000-level courses).
- 7. not apply any undergraduate courses toward the graduate program requirements.
- 8. before attending the Nashville School of Law core courses and continuing in this program, successfully complete

<u>BLAW 6510</u> and attend all Nashville School of Law New Student Orientation sessions set each year on 1.5 to 2 workdays during a designated week in the summer.

## **Curriculum: Legal Studies, Business Law Concentration**

The following illustrates the minimum coursework requirements.

NOTE: The program is designed for students to take two courses (1054L Contracts and 1064L Legal Skills and Values) each worth four (4) credit hours as a student at the Nashville School of Law (NSL). The credit hours for the NSL courses listed below are based on MTSU credit hour calculations and not NSL credit hour calculations which may differ from MTSU calculations. (NSL courses start in the fall and end in the spring based on NSL's academic calendar.) MTSU will transfer each NSL course grade on a pass/fail basis. An NSL course grade that is equal to or above the NSL standard to remain in good academic standing according to NSL policy will transfer as a passing grade. A grade that is below the NSL standard to remain in good academic standing will transfer to MTSU as a failing grade and will not count for credit towards the degree.
